## THE BELONGING BURSARY

As with many students in our Grade Four class, William is curious and friendly. William is also vision-impaired and has specific learning challenges. This past year, William's school benefitted from the Belonging Bursary awarded by the Christian School Foundation. William enjoys school and knows he belongs with his class. But what has it been like for his classmates? To help us answer that question, we asked a classmate, her mother, and the classroom's educational assistant.

**OLIVIA:** William is easy to be friends with because he has certain things that he really loves, and he gets very excited about them. For instance, everyone knows that William loves John Deere tractors,



and we have lots of those at our house. I invited him over to check out all our farm equipment, and he was very happy!

OLIVIA'S MOM: I think all the parents of William's classmates learned from their kids how to engage in conversation with William in ways that spark his interest. It has been fascinating to watch how his classmates have changed and grown by sharing their class with William. He is a real snuggler, and the kids in his class just get that — and are fine with it. They are still willing to hold his hand, give him a hug, and have him rest his head on their shoulder during a story.

**EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANT:** William's classmates see him as one of the students in our classroom. He is never the last one picked for partnering up in class or gym. Students love new seating

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arrangements that involve having him in their "pod". And what's really special for me to see is that William gets lots of invitations to parties. Those take place outside of school, so no one in the school is forcing that to happen. Perhaps some parents had to encourage that in earlier years, but now he gets invited because he is just part of the group. Additionally, we welcomed two new students into our class this past September. I feel like they have really accepted William for who he is so quickly because of the relationships the rest of the students have with him.

**OLIVIA'S MOM:** It has been neat to see Olivia and her classmates see William as part of their community. I think it has helped the whole class be more aware of each others' needs. If they see someone struggling, they are willing to step up and help. That heightened sensitivity has spread beyond just interactions with William, and as parents, we couldn't be happier.

**OLIVIA:** If we are outside, and we see that William needs some help or something, we just pitch in. I know he got to go to another friend's house too, to see their farm animals and to swim. He loved that.

**EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANT:** We had one experience last year that I just need to share. Our class was running the 800m for track and field. It was the first year I didn't physically go with him around the track. William's first lap went great, but on the second lap, he started to struggle. Most of the boys from his class were done the race already, but they ran back onto the track. They finished a whole other lap, running with William and encouraging him to finish. That had many parents and teachers in tears. It was so awesome to see his friends step in without being asked in order to help him out!

**OLIVIA'S MOM:** There is no doubt William has brought something unique to the class and to the school community. The whole place is richer because he is there.
